

Self Declaration for SLC International Airport and Highway Entry Points

In consultation with the State and local authorities, Governor Gary R. Herbert issued an executive order requiring all people arriving in Utah at major highway entry points and the Salt Lake International Airport (with Utah as a final destination) to provide COVID-19 health and travel-related information.

Why are we doing it?

Utahns are working together to do everything we can to slow the spread. This action will save lives while helping our state and economy to get back on its feet more quickly.

By imposing these self-declaration measures, we will be able to inform people about the directives and orders in the state, and ultimately prevent the spread. The more data we have will allow us to have a clearer picture of what we are up against. Knowledge is power.

This action will help keep people safe and slow the spread of the COVID-19.


How will it work?

Upon entering the state, all persons 18 years or older will be required to complete a travel declaration form. Those traveling through major highway entry points will receive a Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) asking them to enter contact, health, and travel information into a simple electronic form on entry. utah.gov. Airport passengers with Utah as a final destination will receive a postcard with a QR code and web address and directions and must self-declare.

The travel declaration will ask if they have experienced any COVID-19 symptoms and/or have been tested for the virus in the last 14 days (along with test results). Additionally, it will ask where they have traveled in the last 14 days and whether they have come into contact with someone who has COVID-19 or was exhibiting symptoms. After filling out the form, the traveler will immediately receive a confirmation email including information about public directives and health orders in Utah. If persons entering the state are informed of the restrictions that exist in Utah, they can align their actions to reduce the spread of COVID-19.

How does the emergency text alert system work?

Just like issuing an Amber Alert, the federal government provided the extraordinary opportunity to use this system to send targeted geofenced wireless emergency alerts to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. The software pinpoints locations where people are coming in and out of the state. These are extraordinary




Sample WEA message

times, and Utah is taking extraordinary measures like using this technology (which we have never used in an instance like this before). There may be some kinks here and there, but it's absolutely essential to help us stop the spread of the coronavirus, COVID-19.

What if someone declares symptoms on the form or says they are infected with COVID-19? Will they be barred from entering the state?

If someone enters on their declaration that they are exhibiting symptoms, someone from the Utah's tracing team will contact and get them quarantined. Having this information will help trace and mitigate the spread.

How will data be kept safe?

The State of Utah will store personal and health related information collected from the declaration form in

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a secure environment and will limit who has access to the data. All personal and health related information will be transferred to the Utah Department of Health for any needed follow-up. Summary information only will be compiled and no unique identifiers will be provided for any public reporting.

What are the ramifications to someone coming into the state? Can they be turned away if they are showing symptoms?

This is simply a data-gathering process. This executive order requires visitors to declare any COVID-19-related symptoms and recent travel information to the state. The goal is to track, trace and mitigate. This is not the complete picture but it's complementary to other data collection systems.

Why aren't non-electronic methods of data collection being offered?

Paper forms will not be offered because they introduce the need for additional resources, methods of collection, and pose the risk of spreading COVID-19 as a result of handling and processing of forms and pencils.

Additional Information

Content for self declaration form

Each person 18 years of age and older entering Utah must submit an electronic State of Utah Travel Declaration Form, as ordered by the Governor, to inform individuals of Utah's current COVID-19 related restrictions and declare information that will be used by the Utah Department of Health to help track and trace COVID-19 infections that may arise from persons who enter the state of Utah from national or international travel.


Entry Location: *The traveler will be asked where they are entering the State.*

Full Name

Anyone older than age 18 will complete their own form.

Health Information

Have you or anyone in your party been tested for COVID-19 in the last 14 days?

The traveler will have the option to select one of four options:

- Yes - Tested Positive
- Yes - Tested Negative
- Yes - Awaiting Results
- No

The traveler has the option to select Yes or No. If yes is selected, the following question is asked:

The traveler can select one of the following:

- UT resident
- Visitor
- Worker

Home Address

The traveler has fields in which to add the following information:

Street Number, City, State, Country, Zip/Postal Code

Home Phone, Alternate (Cell) Phone, Email

Preferred Contact

Traveler is able to select from Home Phone, Alternate (Cell) Phone, and Email

If Visitor or Worker is selected:

Final Travel Destination

The traveler is able to enter a final destination address.

Please list the specific places traveled within the previous 14 days

The form has four fields for the traveler to indicate the locations

City, State, Country

Are there additional people in your group?

If yes is selected, four fields for additional names of people younger than age 18

Names of additional people in your group (younger than age 18)

This is automatically filled out by the form

Authorization

Individuals must check the “Accept” box, verifying the information they provided is true and correct. Then they complete the form by clicking on the “Submit” button.

Verification of declaration form submittal

Once the declaration form is submitted, a verification notice will pop up on the device screen. The message will include links to the Governor’s “Stay Safe, Stay Home” Directive and links to county and city health orders currently in place in the state of Utah.
